The Driver Evaluation Program

The Evaluation Process

Driving is a common part of our everyday lives, so it is often taken for granted. But the act of driving safely requires a complex set of physical and mental competencies. Any impairment in the driver can increase the risk of an auto accident.

The Driver Evaluation Program at the Eastern Virginia Medical School's Glennan Center for Geriatrics and Gerontology identifies a person's strengths and weaknesses behind the wheel.

The program serves adults with a condition that may impair their ability to drive safely, such as...

- Cognitive Impairment
- Dementia
- CVA or Stroke
- Brain Injury
- Natural Aging Process
- Diabetes
- Arthritis

STEP 1: A physician believes driver evaluation would be helpful and refers the driver to the Driver Evaluation Program.

STEP 2: Paper and pencil neuro-psychologic testing is conducted. This measures visuo-spatial function, mental status and divided attention.

STEP 3: The driving simulation is a 30-minute urban course requiring execution of numerous common driving maneuvers. The simulation allows an assessment of the driver's ability to drive and perform the tasks necessary for safe operation of a motor vehicle.

STEP 4: Results of the simulation are discussed with the driver by staff members and a follow-up report is sent to the referring physician.

Referrals
Individuals should be referred by a physician.

Fees
The driver evaluation is not covered under current insurance plans. Fees are payable at the time of evaluation.
